With a great number of workers and hours worked we can see why they would grow.

Paul could have dismissed Athens and Corinth as hard places, but he just did his work and let the results be taken care of by God. He could have complained that his Jewish background and thorn in the flesh made it difficult for him to be faithful, but he did not. He just kept trying to do the best he could to serve God.

Let all of us do all that we can and not try to cop out, bemoaning about the circumstance and the "grass being greener on the other side".
